Norman Levine ('87-'89), Founder CMSA Antonina Nigrelli ('90-'96) Michael Schroeder ('97-'02) Bruce Graybill ('03-'07) Lou Chouinard ('08'-'14) The CMSA is a non-profit society the purpose of which is to promote and support the art of classical mandolin playing in North America. It was formed in 1986 by Norman Levine, a businessman, publisher and philanthropist who has been called "the financial and spiritual impresario of the mandolin world." Norman saw mandolin organizations in Europe and had the vision of a similar North American community of mandolinists.

The CMSA provides education and resources to support existing and new orchestras, including grants for teaching and promotion, materials and instruments. It also publishes the Mandolin Journal and hosts mandolin instruction workshops and contests to promote better playing. Since the CMSA was formed, interest in classical mandolin has surged and new mandolin orchestras have been formed in Atlanta, Louisville, Minneapolis, Nashville, Dayton and Montreal.

The CMSA has over 400 members representing most U.S. states and Canadian provinces and several other countries. Members include mandolinists, guitarists, mandola and mandocello players, conductors, teachers and composers. Members have a variety of backgrounds from bluegrass to jazz to classical. Playing ability ranges from beginners to professionals.

The CMSA has held an annual convention in a different city every year since 1987 to bring together fans of classical music on mandolin. The CMSA offers scholarships to allow students to attend the convention. Through the convention and other CMSA efforts, interest in the mandolin continues to grow as more people are attracted to the beauty of its sound and discover the joy of making music with other people.

### Abraham Lincoln National Heritage Area

The Abraham Lincoln National Heritage Area, the only heritage area named for an American President, is home to a very unique collection of American history, surrounding one of America's most revered Presidents. It is most closely focused on the 30 years Lincoln lived and worked in central Illinois, raising his family and pursuing his passion for the law and politics. During this time, he was unwittingly preparing himself to become the President who would hold the Nation together during a time of unprecedented challenges.

The Abraham Lincoln National
Heritage Area was enacted by
Congress and signed by the
President on May 10, 2008. The
legislation designates the Looking for
Lincoln Heritage Coalition, a
nonprofit 501c3 corporation, to
manage the national heritage area.
Both the coalition and national
heritage area cover 42 counties of
central Illinois and share a mission to
preserve, interpret and promote the
heritage and culture of the area, in
the context of Abraham Lincoln's life
in Illinois.

Outside of his hometown of Springfield, Lincoln probably spent more time in Bloomington than in


any other Illinois city. It was here that he cultivated many of his close personal and political allies and legal associates.




Perhaps one of his

closest friends was Bloomington's Judge David Davis. History has shown that Judge Davis played a pivotal role in both Lincoln's successful legal career and his run for the presidency. Here, you'll discover the stately David Davis Mansion. You'll get a rare glimpse into the daily lives of this wealthy Victorian family as you explore its beautiful room. Meet the people and hear the stories of this city during Lincoln's time when you visit the McLean County Museum of History.

### Local Restaurants

Please accept a warm welcome to Central Illinois from the Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra! If you are looking for nearby establishments for meals or beverages, here are several places that our members frequent:

**Jesse's Grille,** Casual, low-key bar & restaurant in the Marriott hotel providing eclectic takes on American classics.

The Rock Restaurant, 203 W. North Street, Normal, IL, brings Mediterranean and American cuisine to Uptown Normal. Mediterranean items include hummus, grape leaves, spinach pie, gyros and baklava. Around the corner from the Marriott.

**Medici**, 120 W. North Street, Normal, IL, just a stone's throw away from the Marriott, has a unique feel, partially due to the 40-foot tree in its interior. The restaurant offers burgers, seafood, and pizza, with over 30 beers on tap. Around the corner from the Marriott.

**Coffee Hound**, 205 W. North Street, Normal, IL, is a locally-owned establishment, brewing coffees and teas, and offers baked goods to go along with your beverage. Have the barista whip you up a latte and pair it with an orange blossom. Around the corner from the Marriott.

Stave Wine Bar and Market, 111 W. North Street, Normal, IL, offers from a focused and well-curated wine list of a dozen whites and reds by the glass, plus 4 local craft drafts and 24 bottled beers. Not a place for dinner, unless charcuteries and cheese plates are enough to fill you up. Full disclosure: Bruce (mandola) works here as a bartender but he was a regular long before that. Around the corner from the Marriott.

Maggie Miley's, 126 W. Beaufort Street, Normal, IL, a Dublin-inspired pub in the heart of Uptown Normal, is named after an Irish immigrant to McLean Country from the early 1900's and was established by her greatgrandson. 0.2 miles from the Marriott. CoffeeHouse & Deli, 114 E. Beaufort St.,
Normal, IL, is an Uptown favorite that prides
itself on being 100% vegetarian! The
Coffeehouse offers a unique menu with
vegetarian and vegan options. Breakfast is
served all day with fresh-baked pastries, and
daily specials. Sarah (mandolin 2) always orders
the cake and egg for a hearty breakfast. 0.2
miles from the Marriott.

**Firehouse Pizza & Pub,** 107 W. Beaufort Street, Normal, IL, is a casual place for wings, pizza, salads and sandwiches with a firefighter themed décor. Dine-in, take-out or delivery. TVs in every booth. 0.2 miles from the Marriott.

**Fusion Brew**, 503 S. Main Street, Normal, IL, is located a few doors over from Avanti's. It is definitely an ISU student hangout that serves coffee and a dizzying selection of bubble teas. 0.6 miles from the Marriott.

Avanti's Italian Restaurant, 407 S. Main Street, Normal, IL, is a local favorite and is right next to the ISU campus. Jim (mandolin 1) says the menu has something for everyone, from pizza to pasta, salads to sandwiches (try the famous Gondola). The bread is made fresh daily. 0.7 miles from the Marriott.

**Tony's Tacos**, 304 N. Main Street, Normal, IL, is an informal place for quick, authentic and affordable Mexican food. The strawberry horchata is a quite refreshing antidote to anything too spicy! 0.9 miles from the Marriott.

**Tobin's Pizza,** 1513 N. Main Street, Bloomington, IL, is another local favorite pizza place, right between the ISU and IWU campuses. Jim (mandolin 1) notes its pizza and pasta are made from family recipes that span generations. 1.2 miles from the Marriott.

### LOCAL RESCAURANCS (CONC'D)

Taqueria El Porton, 901 N. Main Street, Bloomington, IL, located close to the IWU, this restaurant serves traditional Central Mexican dishes. The carne asada tacos and the caldo de res (beef soup) are favorites of a certain guitarist (Michelle). Friendly service too. 1.9 miles from the Marriott.

Original Pancake House, 115 Veteran's Parkway, Normal, IL, is a popular place for breakfast staples, including – you guessed it – pancakes. 2.0 miles from the Marriott.

Portillo's Hot Dogs, 202 Landmark Drive, Normal, IL, serves more than hot dogs, despite its name. Chicago-style food such as Italian beef, burgers, hot dogs (mustard, no ketchup and on a poppy-seed bun is the Chicago way!) offered. 2.0 miles from the Marriott.

Anju Above, 222 E. Front Street, Bloomington, IL, is described by Bruce (mandola) as a delightful fusion of Asian (steam buns, bowls and the best sushi in town) and creative woodfired pizzas. Order the Korean BBQ wings and save room for the tofu donuts. Excellent craft beer list. 2.3 miles from the Marriott.

Lucca Grill, 116 E. Market Street, Bloomington, IL, serves Italian-American fare, probably best known for its pizza, antique bar and tin ceiling. It's cozy, so a reservation might be the best bet to get a seat, especially for larger groups. 2.3 miles from the Marriott.

**Epiphany Farms,** 220 E. Front Street, Bloomington, IL, offers to farm-to-table fine dining and inventive dishes that vary with the seasons. Many ingredients are sourced from the restaurant's own sustainable farm. 2.5 miles from the Marriott. **Ephesus Restaurant,** 1406 E. Empire Street, Bloomington, IL, which Jan (mandolin 1) frequents, is a family-run Mediterranean restaurant, with a focus on traditional Turkish cuisine including lahana dolmasi (stuffed cabbage leaves), kebabs and mucver (zucchini/potato pancakes). 3.0 miles from the Marriott.

Destihl Restaurant and Brew Works, 318
Towanda Avenue, Normal, IL, is an independent craft brewery and restaurant; Destihl beers are now being distributed across the U.S. and internationally. The location on Towanda Avenue is 1.9 miles from the Marriott. The Destihl Brewery, 1200 Greenbriar Drive, Normal, IL, 3.1 miles from the Marriott, houses the brewery and beer hall serving pub food.

**Thai House**, 805 Morrissey Drive, Bloomington, IL, serves traditional Thai fare from an expansive menu prepared by "Mama Sue." Don't let the unassuming exterior fool you – this place has great food and attentive service. 3.1 miles from the Marriott.

Ancho & Agave, 3006 E. Empire Street, Bloomington, is an upscale Mexican fusion restaurant and relatively new to the area. Enjoy a bowl of fresh tortilla chips, and interesting twists on tacos (such as the sweet potato taco). Nice outdoor patio. 5.0 miles from the Marriott (across from the airport).

### en masse orchestra

The CMSA En Masse Orchestra is one of the largest gatherings of plucked-string instruments in the world. The 2019 orchestra is conducted by **DR. JIM BATES**, who blends discipline and hard work with an injection of fun. Maestro Bates selected new repertoire for the En Masse Orchestra, saying "the program is a trip around the world. Very interesting pieces. Plenty of challenges but also plenty of playable passages." The program includes:• "Suite Marinaresca" four movements by Italian "Golden Age" composer Amadeo Amadei • "Australis Suite" by Stephen Lalor • "Iberia" by Claudio Mandonico • "Yutuma" by Chris Acquavella • "Magnificent Mountain" by 2019 CMSA Composer-in-Residence Dr. Rob Lunn. Rob said, "It is inspired by a trip to the Smoky Mountains I made recently. I loved being in the mountains, especially seeing the mountaintops above the clouds. Depending on how the light hit the mountains they can look very mysterious. In the music I am focusing on those moments."

As well as being a true ambassador of the virtuosic and original Italian mandolin repertoire of the 20th Century, Dutch mandolinist **Sebastiaan de Grebber's** interest also lies in modern music. By portraying the versatility of the mandolin he wishes to inspire contemporary composers to write for the instrument in different formations. Currently, Sebastiaan is music education and mandolin teacher at the ArtEZ Conservatory in Zwolle, is the concertmaster of 'Het Consort, is the director of the 'Kamper Mandoline en Gitaar Orkest' and gives mandolin solo, duo and Quintet recitals and concerts with Eva van den Dool (piano) and much more. ### Naeim Rahmani

Award winning guitarist Naeim Rahmani was born in Isfahan, Iran and immigrated to the United States as a refugee in 2003. Currently based in Seattle, Naeim completed his Master's degree with Rene Izquierdo at the University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee. Naeim has performed throughout the US and internationally and enjoys bringing his music to small community or arthouse spaces where he can interact with the audience. Outside of his performance career Naeim is the director of the Seattle-Isfahan Guitar Project. Naeim is an experienced and popular teacher. He served for several years as the lead classical guitar instructor at the Latino Arts Strings Program in Milwaukee, a non-profit organization dedicated to encouraging the artistic development of youth in the community. While there he also served as director of the annual guitar festival and competition. Naeim currently teaches at Bellevue College and is a booking coordinator for Aranjuez Artists, Inc. ### Fabio Giudice

**Fabio Giudice,** born in Rome, studied the Classical Guitar under the tutelage and guidance of M B. Battisti D'Amario. He obtained a diploma at the Conservatory of Santa Cecilia in Rome and continued specialized courses with other masters such as José Tomas, Alirio Diaz.

His life has been dedicated to the study of plucked instruments and he acquired a diploma in Mandolin at the Conservatory of L'Aquila with M Fabio Menditto. He specialized as an executor of Mandoloncello (Liuto cantabile) and attended specialized courses with M Ugo Orlandi in ancient instruments.

He collaborated in the past and he is at present a guitar and mandolin soloist with many orchestras such as: Accademia of Santa Cecilia, Opera Theatre of Rome, Musici of Montreal (Canada), The Solist of ORM -Losanna, Opera Theatre of Neuchatel (Switzerland), The Ensemble Contrechamps (Ginevra, CH), etc. He has also performed as a soloist in various orchestral formations in many countries throughout Europe, USA, Canada, Australia, Pakistan, Singapore, Tunisia, Turkey, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, Taiwan, Japan and South Korea.

As a Director of Circolo Mandolinistico, "C. Bertucci" of Rome, he organized, for the Rome Municipality, four editions of the Maratona Mandolinistica and many festival and musical reviews. He is the mandolin teacher at the Conservatory "Alfredo Casella" dell'Aquila.



### Dr. Jim Bates



Returning as conductor of the EnMasse Orchestra is our own Jim Bates. He is Director of Orchestral Activities at Otterbein University in Columbus, OH and serves as an assistant conductor for the Westerville Symphony (OH) and Columbus Symphony Youth Orchestras. Conducting duties in the department include leading the string orchestra and directing the early music ensemble. As a conductor and teacher, Dr. Bates is able to draw on considerable experience as an educator, performer and historian. He has served as president of Kentucky ASTA and as string coordinator for the Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts. In addition to string education he is very involved with the Classical Mandolin Society of America and period instrument performance. He is on the National Board of Directors of CMSA and chairs their educational initiatives. Dr. Bates is music director of The Early Interval, Columbus' professional early music performance ensemble and serves on the board of directors for Early Music Columbus. He has degrees from the University of Louisville (B.M.E.), a Masters in double bass performance from Indiana University, where he studied bass with Lawrence Hurst and baroque performance with Stanley Ritchie, and a Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Kentucky. He has two sons, Ethan and Gideon.

### Illinois State University Guitar Ensemble

### The Illinois State University Guitar Ensemble

consists of both undergraduate and graduate guitar majors who explore a variety of classical guitar music while developing listening skills, musicianship, and cooperation. Small groups are formed and chamber music with other instruments are performed during the fall semester. During the spring, the Guitar Ensemble comes together as a large group, performing works written for larger groups or guitar orchestra. A performance at the Mid- America Guitar Ensemble Festival is an annual highlight for the group. Tonight, the group performs the music of Lauridsen, Miyagi, de Falla, Cruz, and Boccherini.



### Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra

The **Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra** was formed in 2003, when a remarkable number of mandolin players began showing up for an old-time jam session meeting regularly in Bloomington, Illinois. Jack Kjeldgaard, a CMSA member, invited those interested to try some classical repertoire as a sidelight. It wasn't long before we organized more formally (in a casual sort of way) as a separate entity, and took

on the name of the McLean County Mandolin Society.

Later it was discovered that our town has a significant precedent for a mandolin orchestra! Mandolinist and local history buff, Amy Miller brought to us the 1894 wedding announcement for Mr. Fred T. Ashton, "well-known music teacher and leader of the Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra." Further investigation of Fred Ashton at our local historical society indicates that Mr. Ashton soon expanded his mandolin orchestra into a larger string ensemble that played for dances and civic occasions, and eventually he became leader of a highly regarded Community Band.




We quickly decided to revive the Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra name for our performing ensemble, while the Mandolin Society remains as an organization that includes those former members who are no longer available to regularly play in the group, along with family, friends and anyone else who has ever mentioned even the slightest interest in our group.

In 1895, Mr. Ashton's Orpheus Mandolin Orchestra consisted of 3 mandolins, violin, flute, harp and cello and advertised itself as "Open to all high class engagements." The current Orchestra is similarly available, of course, having played to considerable acclaim at local retirement communities and Kiwanis club meetings, among other high-minded venues. The modern OMO includes mandolins, mandolas, octave mandolins, mandocellos and guitars.

### Robert Lunn – Composer-in -Residence

This year's composer-in-residence is composer and guitarist **Robert Lunn**. He received his Doctorate of Musical Arts in Music Composition from The Ohio State University in June of 2010. Winner of the 2008 Ruth Friscoe Award for his Sonata for Guitar, Dr. Lunn was a threetime recipient of the Donald and Marilyn Harris Scholarship at Ohio State. He was also awarded the Graduate Teaching Award in Music Theory while teaching at Ohio State. He received a BA from Hope College and a Masters in Music Theory and Composition from The Pennsylvania State University. Dr. Lunn has taught at The Ohio State University, Grand Valley State University, Hope College and Lake Michigan College. He is currently a full-time instructor at Lake Michigan College where he teaches music theory, music technology, guitar and directs the jazz band. He studied guitar with Larry Malfroid at Hope College and participated in master classes with Christopher Parkening and Paul O'Dette. ### OTHER WORKSHOP PRESENTERS

Lou Chouinard attended his first CMSA convention in 2002 and has been hooked on classical mandolin ever since. Lou served on the CMSA board for 12 years as President (7 years), Treasurer (3 years), and as an At-Large director (2 years). He currently serves as the Assistant Treasurer. Lou has attended every convention since 2002 and has been a workshop presenter and the M2 section leader at a number of conventions. Lou has played in the Minnesota Mandolin Orchestra since 2001. Lou has attended numerous classical mandolin clinics and camps. Lou is the perfect example of why enthusiasm and love for music is more important than technical playing skill. He loves introducing new players to the world of classical mandolin and playing in mandolin orchestras.





**Fred Pike** is the President of the Milwaukee Mandolin Orchestra. When not playing with the MMO, Fred is a frequent pit musician, playing some combination of bass, guitar, mandolin, and/or banjo in 6-8 productions a year around the Milwaukee area. His day job involves working with Google Analytics and Google Tag Manager for large B2B companies around the US. More importantly, he'll be part of the backup rhythm for Joe "mando-blues" Binder's Workshop.

Joe Binder has been playing Mandolin for over 40 years. He studied with Jazz luminary & Comedian, Jethro Burns and Italian Classical virtuoso. Giovanni Vicari. Joe has performed solo and as a member of various ensembles including The Mando-Tones, DeLaPenta's Neapolitan Mandolins, The Binder Brothers Blues Band, & Baroque in Blue. He has played the Taste of Chicago & Lyric Opera's gala events. Joe was a Mime & Musician with the Theatre act, Arlequino. In the 70s, Joe moved to New York City and ioined New York's Big Apple Circus as a Clown and Acrobat. There he was schooled in acrobatics by the clown duo, Nina & Gregory Fedin, from the Moscow State Circus. He performed at New York landmarks Macys, the Actor's Studio, & Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM). In addition, Joe was a street performer and half of the Music and Clown duo, Bello & Stein. Currently, Joe is a member of the Chicago area Bluegrass band, Homestretch Ride. The band has played various venues in the Chicago area including Frankfort Bluegrass Fest & Summercamp Festival. They also played the Tailgate N' Tallboys Festival where they opened for Willie Nelson & Kris Kristopherson. Joe recently performed with the Milwaukee Mandolin Orchestra in Tokyo & Chiba, Japan.





Jim Stanlaw, professor in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at Illinois State University, will present a workshop titled "An Early Gibson Show and Tell: The Central Illinois Roots of Lloyd Loar". Stanlaw's presentation will examine instrument innovator Lloyd Loar's Illinois connections. Loar, who was born in Cropsey and grew up in Lewiston, is famous as the engineer/developer of the celebrated Gibson F-5 Master Series mandolin, the iconic bluegrass instrument of Bill Monroe, and the L-5 Gibson Guitar, played by country music pioneer (and mother-in-law of Johnny Cash) Mother Maybelle Carter.

Jim Imhoff After a lifetime of teaching and conducting choral music, Jim is enjoying semi-retirement in Independence, Oregon. He picked up the mandolin shortly after retiring, joined the Oregon Mandolin Orchestra in 2013, and eventually settled on mandocello. OMO hosted CMSA at Portland in 2014, and he is now a lifetime member, having played at the Valley Forge and Milwaukee conventions. Looking for more bass-clef mandocello action in the workshops, he started his quest to find solo music written specifically for this instrument. Join us, and bring your mandocello!





Born in New York, and widowed at 37, **Josephine (Jo) Pellegrini** was classically trained on piano and spent years teaching privately at a Long Island music studio while raising her 3 children. She learned to play the mandolin from her husband Gino Pellegrini, a virtuoso on the instrument. She played with the Long Island Mandolin & Guitar Orchestra, under the direction of Toni Nigrelli. In 1994 she finally moved to California and played second mandolin with Aurora Mandolin Orchestra, and other groups. Her role drastically changed from player to Conductor-Director after her husband's passing in 2006. She has an endless passion to preserve and perpetuate the mandolin to as many people as possible and to continue the tradition and legacy her husband left her through the support and commitment of the members.

**Lon Hendricks** is the CMSA en-masse music coordinator. A long-time enthusiast of acoustic music, he joined the Minnesota Mandolin orchestra in 1992 and became the director later that year. He continues to direct and write arrangements for that group. He has played the mandolin and mandola in several bluegrass and classical ensembles in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area.



Robert Margo is an accomplished performer on mandolin family instruments (liuto cantabile, mandola, and mandolin), classical guitar, and renaissance lute. He studied classical guitar with John Johns (Nashville) and William Newman (Philadelphia), and in masterclasses with Sergio Assad, Manuel Barrueco, and David Starobin. His training on renaissance lute includes lessons with Catherine Liddell, Ronn McFarlane, Christopher Morrongiello, Nigel North, and Paul O'Dette. He has twice been a prize-winner in the Classical Mandolin Society of America's (CMSA) national performance competition.

An avid fan of new music for plucked strings, Margo has commissioned works from Clarice Assad, Philip DeWalt, Jesse Jones, John Goodin, Francine Trester, and Frank Wallace. He frequently writes articles for CMSA's quarterly publication, *The Mandolin Journal*, and he also serves on the organization's Board of Directors. In addition to performing as a solo artist, His arrangements have been performed by Chris Acquavella, Aurora Mandolin Orchestra, Baltimore Mandolin Quartet, CMSA En Masse Orchestra, Dayton Mandolin Orchestra, East Coast Mandolin Orchestra, London Mandolin Ensemble, New Expressions Mandolin Orchestra, and Plektra (Australia), among others.
